From the 22nd to the 26th of October 2025, the 11th edition of **Paris Internationale will celebrate 10 years** of a fully realised utopia: the gathering of a global, committed, experimental and collaborative contemporary art scene. Setting up just a few steps away from the 'hôtel particulier' where the first edition was held in 2015, Paris Internationale is entering a new decade and renewing its vows of independence in a city in full cultural effervescence.

To mark this milestone, the fair launches $\nabla Pi10$, a celebratory parcours honouring a decade of collective experimentation and shared vision. Activating unexpected spaces throughout the venue, $\nabla Pi10$ will feature large-scale interventions by artists from past editions and collaborations with PI alumni. To accompany this, a special publication revisits the conversations, discoveries, and shared visions that have shaped Paris Internationale since its inception.

The opening reception and VIP Preview will be held on the 21st of October (by invitation only).

With 36 selected galleries from 13 countries in 2015 and **66 galleries from 19 countries in 2025**, Paris Internationale has doubled its initial ambitions while retaining the human scale that remains its defining strength. Alongside the founding galleries (Ciaccia Levi, Crèvecoeur and Gregor Staiger), regulars such as Derosia (New York), greengrassi (London), Kendall Koppe (Glasgow), KOW (Berlin), Martins&Montero (São Paulo/Brussels) and Stereo (Warsaw), as well as first-time participants including Bombon Projects (Barcelona), Castle (Los Angeles), Llano (Mexico City) and Martina Simeti (Milan). With no fewer than 52 solo or duo presentations, the 2025 edition particularly focuses on projects that allow for complete immersion in the practices of the artists presented.

Once again this year, Paris Internationale is pursuing its goal of representing a community of shared vision that transcends the commercial ecosystem by renewing its invitations to non-profit spaces. Finally Paris Internationale pursues its partnerships with the Ministry of Culture, the Fondation Pernod Ricard, in charge of the public conversation program, and Lab'Bel - the Bel Group's artistic laboratory.

Paris Internationale's **new location on the Rond-Point des Champs Elysées** 5000m2 + Adresse reflects its transformations. Its Haussmannian facade revives the spirit of exchange and community of 18th-century salons so central to the fair's founding vision, while the vast interior spaces designed by architects Christ & Gantenbein create open areas that foster exploration and discovery, where galleries from different generations from all over the world coexist.

After 10 years of existence, Paris Internationale is proud to maintain a non-profit model in which 100% of the proceeds are reinvested in the following edition. Its alternative, non-hierarchical model in which galleries select their peers based on the projects presented and the values they share, ensures a consistently discerning, independent and forward-thinking selection, bringing together emerging artists, more established ones and even sometimes forgotten







historical figures.

Free since its inception and now deeply rooted in the Parisian and global ecosystem, Paris Internationale appeals to both amateur audiences and the most discerning professionals. Its public programs - the Talks organized with Fondation Pernod Ricard and the Daily Dérives, guided walks led by personalities from the art world who share their interests and discoveries - fully contribute to the richness of the discussions that animate these few days of artistic effervescence. They attract and welcome students, amateurs, exhibition curators, art critics, French and international institutions, and collectors, both novice and experienced. This diversity of visitors is a source of great pride. At Paris Internationale, a collector can make their first purchase alongside a curator from MoMA or the Centre Pompidou!

In 2026, Paris Internationale will take a new step forward with the organisation of a special edition in Milan. This initiative reflects the fair's ambition to open new dialogues with Europe's most dynamic art scenes. Paris Internationale has chosen Milan because its cultural life is today among the most vibrant and influential on the continent. Its art scene — lively, experimental, and deeply rooted in a tradition of creativity — appears particularly suited to hosting an event conceived in the spirit of Paris Internationale. This forthcoming edition in Milan will provide an opportunity to strengthen exchanges between artists, galleries, and institutions across Europe, in keeping with the values of independence, collaboration, and discovery that have guided the fair since its inception.

As Tommaso Sacchi, Deputy Mayor for Culture of the City of Milan, states: "Hosting Paris Internationale during Milan Art Week 2026 means continuing a European dialogue between cities and artistic communities that share values of openness, research, and independence. It is also a recognition of the work carried out to make our city a point of reference for contemporary art — a place where international energies meet and grow together. Milan boasts a long-standing tradition in contemporary art, which in recent years has further strengthened thanks to an increasingly dynamic and interconnected cultural ecosystem. Today, the city can rely on a solid network where institutions, galleries, fairs, artists, and audiences engage in an ever more vibrant and international dialogue. We are delighted that Paris Internationale has chosen Milan for its very first edition outside of France — a sign of trust in the city's cultural vitality and an opportunity to deepen the bonds between our artistic communities."

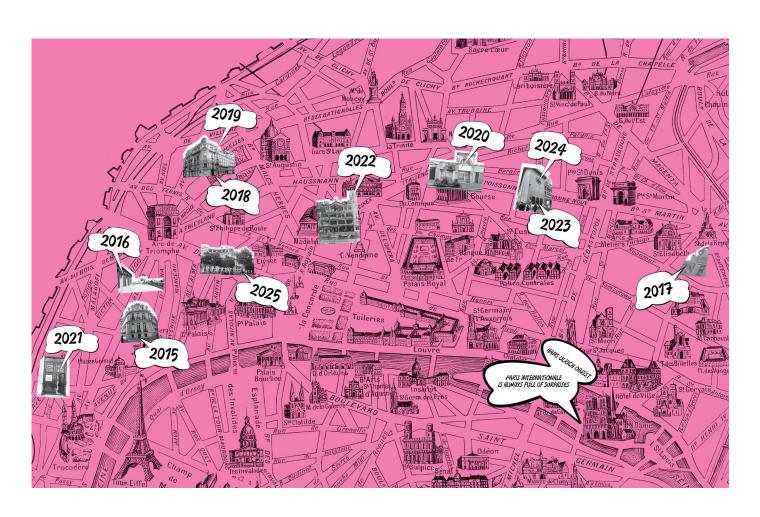


STRUCTURE AND VISION

Founded by and for galleries, Paris Internationale quickly established itself as a necessary alternative to the hegemonic systems of contemporary art fairs.

Its name and identity are borrowed from Guy Debord's Situationist International, to which it owes its philosophy of self-management, dérive, détournement, and emancipation. Closer to the artists and its audiences, the fair successfully brought together a community of galleries that share the same vision of the profession: the sustainable support of a committed, daring, and experimental art scene in a spirit of collaboration rather than competition.

Participating galleries and other special projects are selected by a committee composed of the founding galleries and other participating ones that are regularly renewed.

Nomadism

Since 2015, nomadism has been one of Paris Internationale's signatures.

The fair has taken over various "hôtels particuliers" and Haussmannian appartment buildings, the former premises of the newspaper Libération, the former studio of photographer Nadar, and the Bergère telephone exchange building. Each edition is guided by the same desire to find buildings with a true Parisian soul that contrast with the neutrality of white cubes and where artists can enthusiastically project their work.

The spaces offered at affordable prices make Paris Internationale the preferred choice for emerging galleries. Because they often can be adapted to suit different projects, they also allow more established galleries to show unique and more experimental proposals.

Architecture

Since 2022, Paris Internationale has been collaborating with Basel-based architects Christ & Gantenbein, whose radical scenography challenges the cubic and closed boxes in favor of minimalist walls that respond to the architecture of the city and the invested venues.

Emerging and established galleries are deliberately mixed, taking the opposite approach to the usual sectorization of traditional fairs. Thanks to this architectural design, visitors are guided by their curiosity and invited to engage with the artworks displayed without having to cross any real or psychological thresholds.

Conviviality

As always, Paris Internationale provides its visitors with areas for relaxation as well as vegetarian catering using seasonal and locally sourced produce, allowing discussions initiated in front of the artworks to continue.

Once again this year, the After 8 bookstore will be offering a selection of monographs, artists' books, catalogs, essays, novels, non-fiction, magazines, and zines at the cutting edge of contemporary thought.

VALUES AND COMMITMENT

Eco-responsibility

Eco-responsibility has always been at the heart of Paris Internationale's project. The fair embodies a new model removed from the excesses of global market monopolies. Its philosophy is therefore primarily one of ecosophy, a project based on improvement rather than exponential growth. In this sense, all decisions at the fair are made collectively on the basis of an economy of means. The number of participating galleries is limited and projects are restricted to three artists or fewer. environmental costs (construction, recycling, reuse) are controlled, and particular attention is paid to the ethics of partners from the selection process onwards.

Responsability

Since its first edition, Paris Internationale pays attention to representativeness and inclusivity in the selection of galleries and projects it hosts. In addition to its multi-generational aspect, it has brought forward galleries and artists from 19 countries. and ensures gender parity among participating artists.

Accessibility

In response to the current political and social climate, Paris Internationale is built on principles of accessibility. The fair is proud to welcome more than 20,000 visitors each year and to offer a program of public conversations and guided tours, all free of charge. The premises are also accessible to people with reduced mobility.











EXHIBITOR INSIGHTS

We asked our exhibitors to share their vision of Paris Internationale and what it means to them — a way of showcasing, through their experiences, the collaborative and independent spirit that drives the fair.

ANNE VIMEUX & ELISE POITEVIN (Sissi Club, Marseille)



As a young French gallery, you embody the renewal of the spirit of utopia that the founding galleries carried 10 years ago. Do you think this utopia lives on through you?

Since sissi club opened in 2019, we have been inspired aesthetically and conceptually by Paris Internationale, and we would be delighted if this spirit were still reflected in our approach today. Over the past ten years, the social, economic and political context has changed significantly, and we have had to adapt our approach to this reality. For us, this vision translates into three commitments: to remain rooted in Marseille, far from the centralisation of Paris: to maintain a spirit of research and experimentation through the gallery's exhibitions and activities - residencies. workshops, performances; and to work with artists in a spirit of solidarity and sharing. It is a concrete utopia, outside the context of art fairs: building models of adaptable and viable artistic spaces in a fragile environment, while continuing to invent and be bold.

The fair prides itself on its multi-generational dimension. What does this space for meeting and dialogue with more established colleagues bring you?

Attending Paris Internationale last year, after an initial invitation in 2020 for SuperSalon, was an important moment for the gallery. In 2024, we participated for the first time in several international fairs (Material, ARCO, Liste). Being able to present our programme in Paris was a valuable recognition of our work, particularly in relation to the emerging French scene. These encounters with more estagalleries greatly enrich our blished thinking and strategy and refine the way we work with artists. But they also remind us that young galleries are sometimes perceived as places of prospecting. These confrontations encourage us to further assert our programme and to harden our stance in the face of market dynamics.

Before launching into the market with sissi, you are first and foremost curators. Do you think Paris Internationale has succeeded in its bid to go beyond its commercial role?

Paris Internationale provides a setting that stimulates creativity and experimentation. Last year, we had a complex space to work with, which we loved. That's exactly what we love about this job: playing with the constraints of a space and finding the key—almost magical—to adapting a project to its context. This year, we are presenting works by Lou Masduraud and Madison Bycroft, two presentations from their







recent solo exhibitions in institutions (Le Grand Café in Saint-Nazaire; Triangles-Astérides in Marseille). The constraints of a fair stand are not always obvious for these installation projects, but Paris Internationale offers a setting that fully encourages and enhances this ambition.

POJAN HUANG (Magician Space, Beijing)



This is your third time participating in PI, mainly with solo presentations. Why did you choose to show only one artist at a time, and how receptive is the fair to this approach?

After the pandemic, we felt it was important to return to the international stage. Exchanging ideas between China and the wider world has always been central to Magician Space's vision. With that in mind, and knowing how challenging it can be to introduce one culture to another, we decided to focus on one artist at a time, so that we could fully convey their ideas as well as the cultural and social contexts behind their work.

The gallery is based in Beijing, so why did you choose Paris Internationale as your gateway to the Parisian and European art world? How do the artists you represent interact with the Plaudience?

We began participating in FIAC in 2018, and over the years we've clearly felt Paris

becoming a major centre for art—not only within Europe but internationally. We're drawn to the city's diversity and openness. Many of our peers have spoken highly of Paris Internationale; it's full of vitality and character, which makes it a natural fit for us. That's why, after the pandemic we joined without hesitation.

Visitors have responded enthusiastically to our presentations. Because our projects are grounded in clear and specific contexts, many thoughtful curators have approached us to share their personal insights. We truly value this kind of in-depth exchange.

Have you made any decisive encounters (collectors, professionals, artists, etc.) with whom you continue to collaborate today?

Yes, we've met collectors and curators with whom we've stayed in touch, and we've even hosted some of them in China since then.









PUBLIC PROGRAMS

Talks With & About



The «TALKS WITH AND ABOUT» cycle has been organised since 2024 in collaboration with the Pernod Ricard Corporate Foundation, which shares Paris Internationale's goal of promoting exchanges and discussions between art professionals in France and internationally.

Designed by Alice Dusapin, this year's programme addresses the themes of publishing, exhibiting and collecting in «non-institutional» spaces, providing an opportunity to reflect on the complexity, richness and importance of independence as a means of action. Alice Dusapin is a publisher and exhibition curator.

She is co-founder of the magazine

octopus notes, the publishing house Daisy, and the non-profit space Ampersand. Her research has received support from the CNAP, the Michalksi Foundation, and the Getty Research Institute, and she is a resident of the Académie de France à Rome-Villa Médicis 2020-2021 in art history.

programme reflects a certain «This reality of my practice: I am co-founder of the art magazine octopus notes, the non-profit space Ampersand and the publishing house Daisy. Now considered a trilogy, these projects were all founded collaboratively and arose simply from a desire and a need to "do" - essentially in an independent manner, emphasising the importance and existence of other models. In 2024, I joined a public institution as head of publishing. This new context has introduced me to other working methodologies, and I sometimes feel a certain ambivalence about putting them into practice. The idea behind this programme is therefore to share, through a series of conversations, the complexity and experience of individuals who have founded, manage or invest in non-institutional spaces. What does it mean to try to do things differently? What does "institutional" mean? What are the limitations and joys of these different methodologies. how and can converse?>>

Daily Dérives

These will take the form of daily guided tours inside the fair. In a spirit of leisurely exploration, curators, museum directors, artists, foundation directors, collectors (and sometimes all of the above!), will stroll around and discuss the works on display.

True to the Situationist interpretation of dérive, we favour the expression of personal points of view over academic demonstrations and hope to offer an intimate experience to those tempted to «let themselves be carried away by the solicitations of the terrain and the encounters that correspond to it». (Guy Debord)

Non Profits

Since its founding in 2015, Paris Internationale has been committed to supporting non-profit organisations and contributing to their visibility on the international stage, which they enrich on a daily basis.

A total of 47 non-profit organisations from the French and international scenes have been invited to participate in the fair free of charge to promote their activities, which are essential to the vitality of debates on contemporary creation and the visibility of emerging artists or those working outside the traditional market circuits. Once again this year, seven of them are joining the ranks of exhibitors, deliberately mixed in with the exhibiting galleries: Giselle's Books (Marseille), Goswell Road (Paris), Judy's Death (Paris/New York), La collective (Greater Paris), MORE Projects (Paris), Teatro Grotesco (Turin/Paris) and Something (Abidjan).

Kids Worskshop by ComboToys

Paris Internationale welcomes all generations with the Kids Corner by Combo Toys. Children aged 5 and above can enjoy an interactive play area and inspiring construction games, designed especially for them by contemporary artists.

Bookshop by After 8 Books

After 8 Books is an independent bookshop and publishing house. The bookshop, both in town and online, is committed to supporting artists, theorists, graphic designers and authors active in contemporary publishing.

After 8 Books has been with us since the beginning of Paris Internationale. Book/magazine launches and performances will be organised throughout the fair.
